 - a. Passed The minutes as distributed were adopted
- IV. Discussion Item from 10/3
 - a. AB 710 (Cervantes) the cost of attendance bill
 - i. Gov. Newsom vetoed AB 710 essentially argued that the institutions are already providing the necessary information, but there is a chance the bill can come back next session.
 - ii. Discussion should we pursue this bill idea/lobby for this idea come January?
 - 1. Students should receive a disclaimer pertaining the true cost of attendance for different campuses
 - 2. Will lead to more informed decision on what university/college to attend
 - iii. Should we lobby for this bill idea to come back, or track it?
 - 1. How can we suggest changes to the bill so that it doesn't get vetoed next legislative session?
 - 2. More accountability on universities, since bill gives too much flexibility
 - 3. General consensus on supporting the general idea behind AB 710 come January
 - iv. Alyssa to see where CSSA is on AB 710 for next year
 - b. Further discussion tabled until Nov. 14th

 - a. 4th Year Quantitative Reasoning Requirement
 - i. Chancellor's Office
 - 1. Students to be more prepared with the extra year
 - 2. Waiver for students w/ out many class options that meet the new requirement
 - 3. 2026 is the implementation year for proposal
 - ii. Alyssa gave CSSA perspective as well as other implications (see slides)



- iii. Noah--why him, Christian, Alyssa, & Ethan authored resolution in opposition
 - 1. Not opposed to student success, proposal however will do more harm than good
 - 2. 2026 too soon, not enough time for schools to prepare and make adjustments
 - 3. Negative impact on community colleges, which are currently overburdened
