Hi Hornets!

With 2023-2024 behind us, I would like to share with you all some of the amazing work we are doing at ASI. As your student government, we have a responsibility to ensure we represent the interests of the student body through the implementation of innovative programs, services, and initiatives that enrich student lives.

On November 29th, the ASI Board of Directors voted on awarding 30 ASI scholarships ranging from \$500 to \$1000. We are excited to share we are proposing raising all of the ASI scholarships to \$1000 at our next board meeting. More exciting still, we are also proposing allocating \$10,000 to create a new scholarship program to help cover textbook costs in coming years.

As students, we understand how food and housing insecurity impedes educational access and success. With 42% of Sac State students facing food insecurity, we knew that basic needs insecurity must be our #1 priority. Working with the administration we were able to secure more space for the pantry to expand. This additional space allows the ASI Food Pantry to store more food. I have also been working with senior leadership to establish a Basic Needs Center that will open in Spring 2024. This Basic Needs Center is looking at having a second satellite food pantry to serve more students and establish a clothing closet that would collect donations and create a closet for students to have access to free clothing.

Additionally, your ASI Board recently passed a resolution calling for the establishment of a SWANA Center. In light of recent events in the region, a physical center location for SWANA students is needed now more than ever to provide the community with crisis support.

One last project we are excited to share is a project we have been advocating for since last year. We are excited to share a course of Sac State Campus resources on all students' Canvas. This course lists 8 modules with a variety of resources that help students navigate all the resources on campus. This course is extremely important to centralize information and make it easier for students to find resources. All students will be automatically added to this course before the start of Spring Semester.

Finally, I want to thank the entire ASI Board of Directors for their continuous advocacy and hard work to serve the campus community. I would also like to thank President Wood, Vice President of Student Affairs, Dr. Aniesha Mitchell, and everyone who has supported us.

"My son was just recently diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder this January. What initially started as a concern with his eating habits while in daycare, eventually became a conversation about Emiliano getting tested for any sensory issues.

We set up a meeting between Sherry, Emiliano's head teacher Haley, my husband, and I to discuss Emiliano's habits at home and at daycare. In preparation for this meeting, both Sherry and Haley observed Emiliano and relayed those observations back to us. Their observations went beyond his eating habits, they also included his behavior around his peers and his need to find a quiet area.

Both Sherry and Haley spoke so kindly about Emiliano. Aside from the speech therapy Emiliano was receiving, Sherry mentioned that we should continue to further test Emiliano for any sensory issues that we may have not been aware of. She shared the importance of early intervention and one of the programs available to children through Sacramento County.

The saying 'It takes a village to raise a child' is nothing but the truth. Emiliano is my and my husband's only child. We rely so heavily on this village, on you all, to provide the care, attention, and love when we are not there. Thank you to all the staff members who are part of this village."
